Although many of our prior expectations about Student Confidence levels were confirmed through this exercise, it was not without its share of surprises. Our findings throw up several questions. What are the factors that most influence Student Confidence levels? What is the role of excellent education in ensuring Student Confidence? Does location play a key role?



STUDENTS IN FOCUS


Our research has surveyed 2,807 students across six metros and six non-metros spread across the four major regions of India. We have covered students from classes 6 to 10 and these students have been surveyed in the presence of their parents.





RESEARCH APPROACH

The study captures students' ratings on 20 statements that focus on activities done in schools. Activities were rotated and each statement was given equal weightage to eliminate order bias.



The Confidence Index scores range from 20 to 100. The higher the score, the higher is the perceived Confidence Index. This research reflects students' confidence levels at an all-India level; by metros and non-metros; and other demographic levels.

It also delves into the various attributes that build Confidence; and decodes the Confidence Index of students who study in LEAD-powered schools.



21ST CENTURY SKILLS THAT BUILD CONFIDENCE

Self-confidence in children has never been more important. It is the foundation of all success and achievement in life. It also impacts academic motivation and educational outcomes. We have identified five factors that contribute to confidence-building in students: **Conceptual Understanding**, **Critical Thinking**, **Communication**, **Collaboration** and **Exposure** to opportunities. The 20 questions in this study are mapped to these confidence-building attributes.






A DEEP DIVE INTO EACH SKILL SET





INDIA ON STUDENT CONFIDENCE




At an all-India level, one in every two respondent students is in the **All-rounder** segment, with a little over one-third of students finding space in the **Influencer** segment.

This trend is similar across metros and non-metros, though the size of the Influencer segment in metros (44%) is significantly higher when compared to non-metro* students (28%).


FOCUS ON COLLABORATION




Collaborative learning has been shown to not only develop higher-level thinking skills in students, but to also boost their confidence and self-esteem. Effective collaboration helps students appreciate multiple perspectives and apply new modes of thinking, which is why the relatively low performance of students at an all-India level in this area demands attention. However, there is scope to improve across skills.

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INDIA SCORES 75; WEST INDIA TOPS AT A REGIONAL LEVEL



The Confidence Index is significantly higher among students in metropolitan cities versus their peers in India's smaller towns and cities, a trend that does not seem to have changed much with time. The Confidence Index among students studying in CBSE/ICSE schools is marginally higher than that of State Board students.




West India tops the Student Confidence Index at a regional level, while South and East India hover near the national average.

Significantly higher compared to overall @95% Confidence Level




EDUCATIONAL STAGES



The Confidence Index of students in Classes 9 and 10 is only slightly higher when compared to students in Classes 6-8.








HYDERABAD, A STUDENT CONFIDENCE TOPPER



The Confidence Index of students from Hyderabad is significantly higher when compared to the overall average in India's metros.



Boys and girls are equally confident across metros, barring Chennai and Mumbai, where girls have a slight edge.


Significantly higher compared to Metro @95% Confidence Level


METRO INDEX BY DEMOGRAPHICS



In metros, the Confidence Index of students in Classes 9 and 10 is marginally higher when compared to students studying in Classes 6 - 8.


Similarly, the Confidence Index is marginally higher among students in CBSE/ICSE schools as compared to students in schools affiliated to State Boards.

Interestingly, in Delhi the Confidence Index is marginally higher for State Board students.






SURAT LEADS AMONG NON-METROS



The Confidence Index of students from Surat is considerably higher when compared to students from other non-metro cities.


In non-metros, the Confidence Index of students of LEAD-powered schools is higher across segments.





LEAD STUDENTS BUCK THE TREND

While most regular schools tend to prioritise conceptual understanding of subjects, LEAD's Integrated School System focuses on the development of all five 21st-century skills critical for students to succeed in life. Overall, students of LEAD-powered schools in non-metros have fared better in each skill development area.

IN SUMMARY



For Atmanirbhar Bharat, India must first become Self-Confident or Atmavishwasi; and India's Confidence begins with its students. At an overall level, India stands at 75 on a scale of 100 on the Student Confidence Index; and 36% of respondents have indicated top-bracket Confidence levels (81-100) in 2022.




Gaps in the Student Confidence Index between India's metros and non-metros indicate scope for improvement in Student Confidence levels in India's smaller towns and cities. These gaps are attributable to differences in Confidence-building skills in students and this is what LEAD is focused on. LEAD's Integrated School System has been designed for the realities of schools in small towns and solves for all stakeholders of the schooling system - students, school-owners, teachers and parents.



Students of LEAD-powered schools have outperformed their peers in non-metros on all five critical skills that together constitute holistic 21st century learning - **Conceptual Understanding; Critical Thinking; Communication; Collaboration;** and **Exposure**.
